Something to Try:

Possum Grape Drink

- Possum Grapes (Muscadine)
- Cornmeal
- Water

To prepare: Remove the grapes from the stems, wash, and stew them in water. Once the grapes are done, mash in the water. Let this sit until the seeds settle. Then strain out the seeds, but preserve the liquid. Put the juice back on the fire and bring to a boil. Add a little cornmeal to thicken the juice. Continue cooking until the meal is done. Remove from the fire and drink hot or cold. Sweeten, if desired.
