

University	Course Repeat and Grade Replacement Policies
Appalachian State	Credit for a course only 1x. If course repeat involved a grade of F, @F, U or WF; initial credit will be subtracted from student's total. Grade earned in initial attempt can be excluded for up to four courses; course remains on transcript. Content change provisions.
East Carolina	If a student earned a C or better, courses can be repeated only in extenuating circumstances and there is an approval process. A student who repeats a course he or she has passed in order to raise the grade will receive the original grade, hours attempted, hours earned, and grade points. The student will also receive the raised grade, hours attempted, and grade points. The raised grade, or last grade, stands. A grade of F as the raised grade will result in the loss of the original hours and grade points; a student receiving an F as the raised grade must repeat the course if credit is required for graduation. A student who repeats a course he or she has failed will receive the failure (hours attempted and no grade points) and the raised grade with hours attempted, hours earned, and grade points.
Elizabeth City State	No repeats for credit if a C or better grade was earned. D or F grades can trigger a repeat if the course is required and a C is necessary or if the course description allows. If six or more years have passed and updated content is an issue, courses can be repeated or may be required to be repeated. A course may only be repeated 2 times. A maximum of 15 hours can be repeated. All grades will be on the record. Only higher grades will be used in calculating GPA.
Fayetteville State	Students may repeat a course, but can only earn credit hours once for any given course (except in cases where the faculty designate a course as one that can earn credit more than once). When a student repeats a course, the lower grade is excluded from the calculation of the Grade Point Average and the higher grade is included. A student is allowed a maximum of five distinct course repeats without penalty (this means five different courses with five grade exclusions; a student cannot replace the grades of the same course more than once). "Without Penalty" means that only the higher grade will be calculated into the student's Grade Point Average. All original entries and grades will appear on the student's permanent record, with the designation that lower grade has been excluded from the Grade Point Average. If a student repeats the same course for a second time or more, and/or exceeds the five course/ five grade exclusion limit, all attempted hours will be counted and all grades will be calculated into the Grade Point Average. However, students can only earn credit once for each course. If a student earns a passing grade twice for the same course, only one set of course credit hours will be counted toward graduation. All repeated courses are included in a student's total attempted hours. The tuition surcharge will apply for all hours attempted beyond 140 credit hours.
North Carolina A&T	Failing grades in required courses demand repeat. No course can be repeated more than 2 times. A course where a C or higher was earned cannot be repeated without special permission. All earned grades will appear on the record.
North Carolina Central	Five course repeats allowed without penalty. The lower grade in is excluded from GPA calculation. After five courses, all grades will be in the GPA computation. If a student receives a C or better, the student may not repeat, but may Audit without credit.
North Carolina State	Undergraduate students may repeat a course for credit once without permission if the previous attempt was completed with a grade of D+ or less. Students must have permission from the Dean of their respective college to attempt a course for credit more than twice. A student must obtain his or her adviser's approval before repeating any course previously passed with a C- or better. No approval shall be given when: The student wishes to repeat a course in which a grade of A or B has already been earned; The student wishes to repeat a lower division course that they have passed with a grade of C- or better after having successfully completed an advanced course dealing with the same subject matter; The student wishes to repeat a lower level course that they have passed with a C- or better which is a prerequisite for an advanced course that they had already successfully completed; or, A student wishes to take an introductory course after they have successfully completed an advanced course dealing with similar material. Except as provided in NCSU REG02.20.16 – Undergraduate Grade Exclusion , grades for all attempts will be included in the cumulative grade point average. Undergraduate students may select up to two NC State courses with posted letter grades of C- or below to be excluded from calculation of their cumulative grade point average. Once a grade exclusion is applied to a course, the grade points and the credit hours attempted and earned on the course will be removed from the calculation of the cumulative grade point average and from the calculation of

	<p>the total hours attempted. The course title and grade for the course will be shown on the official record with a notation to indicate the grade was excluded from the computation of the cumulative grade point average. Excluded courses cannot be used to satisfy degree requirements. There is also a first year course repeat policy, but it does not show up when clicking the link.</p>
UNC-Asheville	<p>If a student repeats a course for which he or she has earned a grade of C or better, the new hours and quality points will not be used in the calculation of the grade-point average nor will the new hours count toward graduation requirements. If a student repeats either a failed course or a course in which he or she has received a C-, D or U grade, only the new quality points and semester hours of credit will be used in the calculation of the grade-point average. However, if the second grade is an F, no credit is earned and both grades will be used in the calculation of the grade-point average. Courses taken at other institutions cannot be used to replace a grade earned in a UNC Asheville course. A student may take advantage of this forgiveness clause for a maximum of 15 semester hours of credit. However, the student's permanent record will be a complete record of all courses attempted and the grades received for these courses</p>
UNC-Chapel Hill	<p>Students who have received passing grades in courses may not enroll in the same courses at a later time without the approval of their academic dean. If a student proceeds with such an enrollment without securing permission, any grade received beyond the initial enrollment may be administratively removed from the student's academic transcript.</p> <p>A second enrollment in a course for which a student has received a grade less than C through a previous enrollment at the University will be approved by an academic dean at the request of the student if any of the following apply:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The course is specifically required by the student's academic major and is a prerequisite to other courses required in the major; • At least a grade of C (2.000) must be earned in a course specifically required in the student's academic major to satisfy graduation requirements in the academic major; • Several years have elapsed since a student's initial enrollment in a course and a current, satisfactory knowledge of the course material is either required or advisable. <p>In some circumstances, permission may be granted to repeat a specific course regardless of the grade earned during the initial enrollment. If a student is permitted to repeat a course in which a passing grade previously has been earned, no additional credit hours beyond the first enrollment will be counted toward the fulfillment of the University's minimum graduation requirement of 120 academic hours. Grades and academic hours earned as a result of both enrollments, however, will be computed in the student's semester and cumulative grade point averages.</p>
UNC-Charlotte	<p>A student may receive credit for a course one time only unless the course description specifies that it "may be repeated for credit." In all other courses, a student who has received a grade of C, H, P or better in a course may repeat that course only with prior approval of the student's advisor, department chair, and dean. An undergraduate student who received a D, F, or U in a course may repeat a course without seeking outside approval. All grades for repeated courses will be shown on the student's official transcript and be used in the calculation of the grade point average. For prerequisite purposes, the most recent grade will be used whether or not it is the highest. Repeats can be with or without grade replacement. The former is for up to 2 courses with a maximum of 8 credit hours. Both grades will be on the transcript, but the higher will be used for GPA calculation. Without is for D, F, or U grades; courses where a grade of C, H, P or better require special permission. In this case, all grades will be on the transcript and used for calculation of GPA. There are exclusions to this policy.</p>
UNC-Greensboro	<p>Except for courses with specific provision in the course description for repeated credit, a UNCG undergraduate student may repeat a UNCG course in an attempt to earn a better grade. Students may request that an original grade in a course be removed from the Grade Point Average (GPA) and replaced by the grade earned in the repeated course. Only 300-level and below courses may be repeated. During their undergraduate careers students may request to replace the grades for a total of three courses, regardless of credit- or semester-hour value. For example, a student may replace a single course three times, or a combination thereof, not to exceed the limits of the policy. In the case of</p>

	<p>all other repeated courses, attempted hours and grade points from all attempts will be counted fully in the GPA. Semester hours earned for the course will count only once in the total hours for the degree. Departmental policies supersede this policy. Grades can be replaced for courses taken fall 2005 and thereafter.</p> <p>Students shall be given one year following the semester in which a course was taken to petition to drop the course retroactively.</p>
UNC-Pembroke	<p>A student who wishes to repeat a course must adhere to the following policies:1. The original course and the repeat course must be taken at UNCP.2. The course being repeated must be the same course taken previously; no substitutions are allowed.3. Students may repeat a course a maximum of three times. Exceptions to this limit require approval of the chair of the department offering the course and the appropriate dean.4. All grades received in courses repeated will be used to compute the quality point average, unless the student elects to use a grade replacement. 5. A student will receive credit (earned hours) for a course one time, and the most recent grade will be used in meeting graduation requirements.6. All entries remain a part of the student's permanent record.</p> <p>Beginning with the fall semester of 1994/ undergraduate students who enter UNCP and who wish to replace a course grade must adhere to/the following policies:1. A student must follow all regulations regarding repetition of course work.2. Some courses may be taken more than once for full credit; these courses are not eligible for grade replacement.3. The semester hours and quality points in courses repeated are counted only once, and the most recent grade and the quality points corresponding to the most recent grade are used in computing the quality point average and meeting graduation requirements.4. Students entering UNCP as freshmen will have the option of replacing a maximum of 15 credit hours with improved grades earned by repeating courses. No student is eligible for more than 15 hours of replacement credit regardless of his/her entry date.5. The credit hours associated with each repeated course will count toward the cumulative replacement hours.6. Students transferring or readmitted to UNCP may replace grades for courses taken at UNCP for a maximum number of hours as determined by the scale below, which is based on the number of hours accepted for transfer or readmission.</p>
UNC-Wilmington	No repeats for a grade of C or better. For the first five courses repeated (number may have recently dropped to 3; separate courses are intended), the previous grade and hours will not be used in calculating the GPA and hours toward graduation. A failing grade for academic dishonesty is not subject to repeat.
UNC School of the Arts	Students currently enrolled may repeat a required core general education course in which a D or F was earned. The student may request to have only the higher of the two grades count in their Grade Point Average (GPA) calculation one time for up to 12 hours of course work. The academic transcript will reflect all course grades; however the replaced grade will not be used in calculating the cumulative grade point average. Grades cannot be replaced for courses offered within the art schools. No replacement is allowed for academic integrity violations.
Western Carolina	A maximum of 15 credit hours may be repeated. When a student repeats a course, only the most recent grade will be used in calculation of the student's grade point average and counted in the hours toward graduation. However, all grades shall remain on the student's transcript.
Winston Salem State	Repeating a course is only allowed two times (with some majors and minors permitting fewer). Repeats only if a D or F was earned. Highest grade is used for GPA, other grades will remain on the transcript. No grade replacement policy located.
