The commencement will afford those graduates an opportunity to be recognized in-person in their regalia, with family friends present.

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## September 11<sup>th</sup> 20-Year Commemoration Events

2021 represents the 20<sup>th</sup> year since the terrorist attacks that occurred on September 11 in New York City, the Pentagon, and on a plane over a field in Shanksville, Pennsylvania. This year we will respectfully recognize the day and pay special tribute to the 2,977 lives lost on that fateful day 20 years ago. Through both reflective and engaging programs, WCU will pause and remember the events of that day and the impact on us as individuals, as a community, and as a nation. To facilitate this day of remembrance, the Center for Community Engagement and Service Learning, along with other campus partners including Military Student Services, Student Government Association, Health and Wellness, Staff Senate, Educational Outreach, and the Chancellor's Office, have organized the following programs:

- 9/11 Days of Service (*Friday and Saturday, September 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup>*) will engage nearly 100 volunteers across a range of projects around our community (view and sign up here: <https://wcu.campuslabs.com/engage/event/7115997>).
- 9/11 Remembrance Memorial between the Alumni Tower and the University Center where 2,977 American Flags will be displayed commemorating each life lost 20 years ago. Visit and pay your respects from noon on Friday, September 10<sup>th</sup> to noon on Monday, September 13<sup>th</sup>.
- 9/11 Reflection Walk around campus will be sponsored by the Office of Military Services. There will be a QR code that attendees can scan for a list of all those who lost their lives on 9/11.
- First-Responder Gratitude Baskets, sponsored by the Chancellor's Office, will be delivered to local first responder organizations with notes of appreciation and sustenance gifts to demonstrate our support and appreciation as a community.
- 9/11 Reflection and Commemorative Video presenting voices of faculty and staff members who remember where they were and the impact that 9/11 had on their lives, and students who reflect on the impact that day has had on the world they live in today. ## Office of Student Retention

To improve support of our students on the path to success, Mentoring and Persistence of Success (MAPS) and the Office of Student Transitions have become part of an expanded Office of Student Retention. The directorships of these two offices are restructured to, respectively,

- Associate Director of Retention, Mentoring and Persistence to Success Coordinator
- Assistant Director of Retention, Student Transitions Coordinator

We are launching national searches for both positions. All staff in these offices now report to the Director of Retention. Retention efforts are going to be even more important at WCU in future

years, so combining the offices to a larger Office of Student Retention will allow synergies between the different initiatives, greater flexibility to assign work uniformly throughout the academic year and summer, improvements in efficiency of support staff, and enhancements in continuity of operations.

The other offices in the Division, namely, the Office of Accessibility Resources, the Advising Center, the Writing and Learning Center (WaLC), and the Mathematics Tutoring Center (MTC) will continue their central roles in student success. Accessibility, advising, learning communities, tutoring, coaching, supplemental instruction, and the many other functions of these offices feature significantly in student retention.

## Tutoring

The WaLC (Writing and Learning Commons) and the MTC (Math Tutoring Center) are fully operational for Fall 2021, offering both face-to-face and virtual tutoring. Supplemental instruction in targeted courses will operate at full capacity. In addition, we are piloting a peer coaching model for targeted sections in Liberal Studies courses.
