Nine WCU Students Learn Spanish in Costa Rica

Every summer, **WCUSpanish** offers a faculty-led study abroad program in Costa Rica for students taking Spanish 240 who need an immersion experience that fits between semesters. This past summer, nine WCU students traveled with Garrett Fisher to Costa Rica, where they had classes at the Instituto Tecnológico de Costa Rica and even learned the past perfect tense on the sands of the beach in Manuel Antonio National Park. The group donated supplies to a Costa Rican elementary school and lived with host families, enjoying plenty of opportunities to practice their Spanish.
