Students in SPAN 493 travel to Cuba

Most of them never thought travel to Cuba would be possible until they registered last spring for SPAN 493 (Cuban Culture), but during Fall Break eight WCU students traveled to Cuba to visit historical sites, meet everyday Cubans, and take classes—16 hours!—at a cultural research center.

Although the trip included sightseeing, a beach excursion, and lots of ice cream, it certainly wasn't a luxury tour: the students were housed in austere lodgings for priests, dined on budget food, and

walked nearly everywhere they went within Havana.

Even so, the consensus among the travelers was a positive one, despite delays due to transportation difficulties, unexpected site closings blamed on mosquito fumigation, and the occasional currency exchange mistake.

While in Havana, the students attended four days of classes on culture, history, and race relations with professors Juan Nicolás Padrón and Rodrigo Espina and interacted with a dozen members of

[Proyecto Comunitario Espiral](#), a non-profit community outreach group with elementary schools and homes for the elderly.

All SPAN 493 students will present findings of Cuba-related research at a symposium open to the public at the end of Fall semester. (And yes, the presentations will be in English, so if you can read this you can attend!) Language t-shirt design winners announced

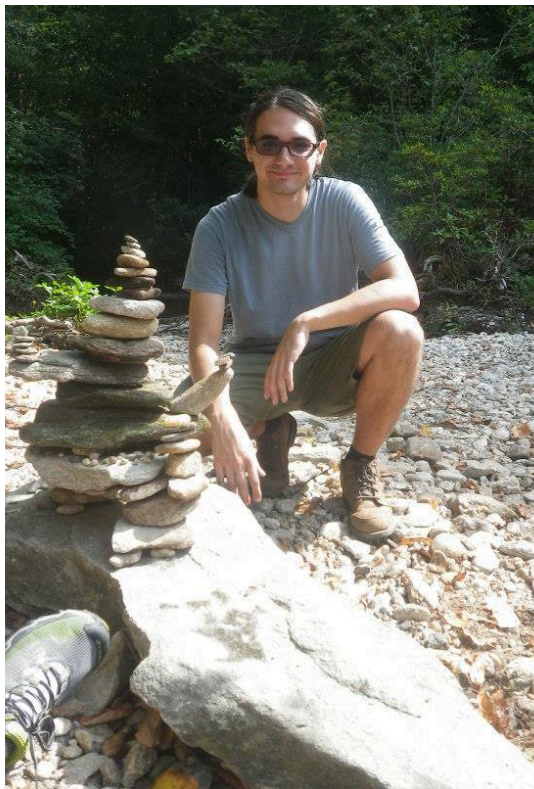
