

Pre-Occupational Therapy

In order to become an occupational therapist, you must:

- complete a bachelor's degree (in any major) [WCU Undergraduate Major Options](#)
- take the appropriate prerequisite coursework (see *list of programs for specific requirements*)
- take the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) Examprep.wcu.edu
- obtain required experience or shadowing hours (see *list of programs for specific requirements*)
- apply through OTCAS, some colleges may require additional applications [OTCAS](#)
- complete a Masters or Doctorate level Occupational Therapy program [List of programs](#)
- pass the NBCOT Certification Examination and apply for licensure in state of practice NBCOT.org

What should I major in?

While there is no prescribed major for admission into a occupational therapy program, it is imperative that students complete all required courses for admission. OT programs vary significantly in their requirements, and it is important for you to learn what coursework the schools that interest you want. Students should choose their major according to their strengths, interests and alternative career choices. The Occupational Therapy Centralized Application Services (OTCAS) is used by the majority of OT schools but individual schools may also require a separate application to their institution as well. Minimally, a student should complete these courses at WCU with a B or better for entrance into many occupational therapy programs:
